In just the seven days before I sat down to write this editorial, your charities disbursed more than £15,000 to serving and retired Gunners – when they needed it most.

Your charities do amazing work, every minute, every day, every week, every year.

Everything from support in times of devastating bereavement, mobility assistance, vital mental health assistance, and the purchase of household goods to help with travel costs.

On top of this, we granted more than £5,000 to units/sub-units in support of community events such as Battery Birthday celebrations and families’ days. And, we released over £12,000 to Gunner sports teams, and individuals, to allow them to flourish (including grants to enable teams to tour overseas).

It is an honour for me to be invited to write the guest editorial for this edition of Gunner as I take up my new role of Regimental Secretary and CEO of the RA Charities from Matthew Carter who retires after seven years of tremendous service to The Royal Regiment.

I thought I knew how incredible the charities were but, I’ll admit, I did not know exactly how broad, how deep, and how crucial they are - and what a profound difference they make to so many people’s lives; to those of us who have or are proudly serving and those who love them.

The RA Regimental Charities comprise three main charitable organisations: The Royal Artillery Charitable Fund (RACF) focused on ‘individual welfare’ for serving and retired members of the Gunner family (through individual case support and via welfare grants to units); The Royal Artillery Institution (RAI) focussed on ‘organisational welfare’ (grants to units, heritage, support to adventurous training and sport, improving the lived experience of soldiers, support to regimental events (Remembrance, Sandown, etc); The Royal Artillery Association (RAA) focussed on ‘community welfare’ (support to the veteran community through the

RAA Branch network and strengthening links between the serving and retired regiment).

Since the beginning of the year The RACF has made grants totalling £147,000 to 182 individuals in need. Of this £21,000 was to 23 members of the serving Regiment. For this year, another £95,000 has been allocated to Gunner units, via grants, to provide welfare support at unit level. In total we expect to disburse over £800,000 this year in support of welfare. In doing so, we live by the mantra: “Once a Gunner, always a Gunner”. You only need to have served one day in the Royal Artillery and we will take care of you, when the need arises, for the rest of your life.


The RAA will disburse over £200,000 this coming year on supporting the vibrant veteran network centred around 86 active branches and strengthening the relationship between the serving and retired regiment through grants to Batteries and Units. The RAA also deliver some of our key events such as the RA Assembly in Blackpool, Gunner Sunday at the Royal Hospital Chelsea and the annual Gunner gathering at the National Memorial Arboretum.

Since 1 January The RAI has delivered £178,000 to sports teams/individuals, heritage, support to Initial Trade Training, projects to improve the lived experience of soldiers, adventure training and support to Regimental Events. By the end of the year support to similar activities will see the RAI grant in excess of £600,000.

I look forward to meeting many more of you at the events in our packed calendar – the RA Assembly, the National Memorial Arboretum, Hyde Park Corner, Sandown to name but a few.

I’ll finish where I started, it’s an honour to be in this role and as I settle into it, I think of the quote attributed to Theodore Roosevelt that drives my approach to all things:

“People don’t care how much you know until they know how much you care”.

FORMATION OF THE KING’S GURKHA ARTILLERY

Many of you will have heard rumours about the formation of the King’s Gurkha Artillery (KGA) and some will have seen recent coverage in the press, including the announcement in Parliament yesterday. I would like to formally share the details behind this hugely exciting moment in the history of the Royal Regiment and the Brigade of Gurkhas. For the Royal Regiment, the Gurkhas bring a wealth of experience and skills; for the Brigade of Gurkhas, the KGA offers exciting, different career opportunities.

The KGA has been approved by His Majesty The King, our Captain General, and is now established. The initial tranche will consist of 70 transferees from across the Brigade of Gurkhas, arriving in Jun 25; and 20 new Gurkhas, from recruiting intake 2025, who will complete their training at ITC Catterick, arriving in Larkhill in Nov 25. Subsequent years will continue to see a combination of transfers and new recruits, building to an overall strength of 400 by 2029. In common with all other Gurkha cap badges, the direct entry officers will be on UK terms of service; late entry officers will be Gurkhas. All KGA personnel will be employed in the Close Support discipline, initially training on Light Gun, then Archer and ultimately the Mobile Fires Platform.

The KGA Headquarters will be co-located in Larkhill with 14 RA. Commanding Officer 14 RA will be resourced with a small team – Gurkha Major, Adjutant and Sergeant Major – to enable them also to be Commander KGA. The initial workforce will fill 34 Bty then, as the numbers increase, it is planned that the KGA will populate an existing battery in 1 RHA, 19 RA and 4 RA.

The formation of the KGA is a significant milestone in our history and an exciting view of a bright future. They will add strength, breadth and diversity to our ranks, and I have no doubt will establish themselves as key members of the Gunner family.

United Kingdom Commando Force in the High North - WINTER DEPLOYMENT

As the global security environment shifts our adversaries are refocusing. The thawing of the transpolar and northern sea routes has created a strategic flashpoint - increasing Russian interest in the region. This pivot has been accelerated by significant technological advancement, brought on by the Russo-Ukraine conflict, and the ascension of Sweden and Finland into NATO. Just over the border from Norway is Murmansk - home to the Russian Northern Fleet and nuclear second-strike capability. The deployment of Russian Anti-Access Area Denial (A2AD) assets would significantly hinder naval and air freedom of manoeuvre in the region, constraining NATO's ability to respond to a Russian incursion or aggression. Consequently, the Scandinavian coastal region and mountainous plateaus

have become a potential flashpoint on NATO's northern flank.

United Kingdom Commando Force (UKCF) offers a unique capability within defence - specialising in operations in extreme cold weather and mountain warfare, including ski-borne infantry manoeuvre and over-snow reconnaissance vehicles. UKCF is an advance force, intended to degrade enemy A2AD assets and strike deep targets, enabling theatre entry for a NATO Joint Force. UKCF provides this capability by specialising in littoral raiding and special operations on high value enemy assets, operating as a disaggregated force of small teams.

Excellence in Arctic warfare is not a given — it's earned through rigorous training. This is why British commandos have been



training in the High North since the 1980s. To guarantee the abilities of UKCF personnel, all individuals expecting to exercise in the High North are required to undertake the rigorous Cold Weather Warfare Course (CWWC). Spanning multiple weeks, the course teaches the fundamentals of ski-borne manoeuvre and equips personnel with the skills to thrive and fight in the harsh arctic environment where temperatures frequently dip below -30 degrees. The CWWC teaches skills that are crucial to operate safely and effectively. On completion of foundation courses, subunits undertake special to arm training, further familiarising themselves with equipment and refining tactics, techniques, and procedures for operations in the High North. This phase not only enhances readiness but also ensures every soldier is familiar with their role in the broader mission.

The 2025 deployment culminated in a divisional multi-national training exercise, JOINT VIKING. The exercise saw 7 (Sphinx) Commando Battery Tac Group

enable targeting of enemy assets in the deep utilising the full spectrum of NATO strike assets. For the Gun Group, JOINT VIKING 25 was an opportunity to hone interoperability with host nation and NATO partner forces - ensuring robust communications networks and refining tactics. The exercise also identified unique areas for equipment development and acquisition; ensuring UKCF remains at the cutting edge of extreme cold weather warfare. Winter deployment provided ample time for personnel to grow close ties to their international opposite numbers, allowing everyone to understand the differences in how each nation works and areas for improvement.

As the High North becomes more contested, UKCF's unique skillset is more relevant than ever. Multi-domain fires and targeting provided by 29 Commando Regiment Royal Artillery are central to the United Kingdom's contribution to NATO and deterring a resurgent Russia.

Between 10-29 Jan 25, F (Sphinx) Parachute Battery, 7 Para RHA, deployed a 3 person FST to Japan on a bilateral exercise with the Japanese Ground Self Defence Force (JGSDF) known as Ex VIGILANT ISLES 24. As part of B Company Group 3 PARA, members of F Bty conducted partner training including; capability demonstrations, lessons on kit and equipment held within an FST, air assaults, cultural days and a final exercise.

Having arrived in country the Company Group conducted a Reception, Staging, Onward Movement and Integration (RSOI) package followed by Company-level training to familiarise ourselves with the training area. This involved navigation, medical and blank firing training, as well as doing partner training with the JGSDF. We conducted aviation assaults, passage

of lines and resupply demonstrations with JGSDF to optimise our integrated operation when working together on the exercise. During the final exercise the Company Group operated as a light role company having conducted an aviation insert initially utilising a wide fleet of CH-47 and UH60s. Throughout, the FST had a JGSDF FOO attached to them including MFCs, this gave an excellent insight into the way the JGSDF control and deliver fires.

Ultimately, this was a brilliant exercise and despite it being a small team it allowed members of 7 Para RHA to develop our understanding of how our allies work.

Exercise WESSEX STORM



Ex WESSEX STORM

In February 7 Para RHA deployed N Para Bty's Tac Group and F Para Bty's Gun Group to support 4BCT's Ex WESSEX STORM. Unlike previous incarnations of this exercise the entire Brigade was exercised against a free-play enemy, rather than a single Battlegroup.

The Army's desire to implement lessons from Ukraine saw us experimenting with a wide array of new capabilities and methods of employment while simultaneously going 'back to basics'. Consequently, alongside experiments with FPV drones and loitering munitions we were digging in, conducting CBRN fire missions, and constantly moving around AMAs to limit our exposure to Counter-Battery fire.

A highlight of the exercise was our experimentation with the Hellsing One-

Way Effector, a cutting-edge loitering munition. It immediately proved to be a vital force multiplier. Analysis post exercise showed that Fires accounted for over 65% of all enemy kills, rising to 75% on some later missions. The Hellsing's significant contribution to this tally confirms this is vital battle winning technology that the Royal Artillery must acquire and exploit at the earliest opportunity.

Overall, Exercise WESSEX STORM was a pivotal training event, pushing our Regiment's capabilities to new heights in both traditional and modern warfare.

Exercise BULLS SCHOLAR BATTLEFIELD STUDY (BFS)



Hora Sfakion viewpoint

This March, 24 members from 7 Para RHA deployed on Ex BULLS SCHOLAR, a battlefield study (BFS) to Crete led by I Bty (Bull's Troop) RHA.

Operation MERCURY saw 22,000 German paratroopers jump into Crete in May 1941; an act that is widely regarded as the first mass airborne invasion. The resulting weeks saw Crete fall to the Axis forces and mass evacuations to North Africa from the Allies. It also however, convinced Winston Churchill into pushing for the founding of our own British Airborne Forces, recognising their potential significance in future battles. A fitting example of the odds stacked against Airborne Forces in what would be I Battery's first BFS since its re-animation as an equipment Battery.

The week saw SP visit Maleme airfield, Chania and Souda Bay; locations where large numbers of German paratroopers jumped into on the 20th May 1941, and subsequent early battles took place. Members of the Regiment also retraced the 40-mile march, along which the defeated New Zealander, Australian, Greek and British troops slogged to their evacuation point at Hora Sfakion. This journey included stopping at key sights along the withdrawal route including Lt Gen Freyberg's Cave where the commander of Commonwealth Forces on the Island oversaw the evacuation. Throughout the week there was much discussion comparing airborne and artillery equipment and tactics of the past to the present, as well as the similarities between




the 10 Fallschirmjäger Commandments and our own Pegasus Ethos.

For his exemplary service, hard work, effectiveness, contribution, skills, commitment, loyalty, and devotion to duty





This Christmas, TEAM V3NTURE, consisting of Capt Charles Newman, (7 Para Regt RHA) along with friends Capt Rob Treasure (1 RIFLES) and Capt Robert Cross (1 Welsh Guards), became the first military trio to row any ocean.

After several years of planning and preparation, the trio took part in The World's Toughest Row-Atlantic, fleet of 2024. This 3,000nm unsupported ocean rowing race takes place every December, departing from La Gomera, in the Canary Islands, and heading to Antigua. Crews that take part face intense heat, vast Atlantic swell, extreme weight loss and the constant threat of sea sickness.

On 11th December 2024, the team pushed off on their 8-metre RX45 Ocean rowing boat, knowing that until they navigated their way safely to Antigua, they were exposed to mother nature at her finest. Many blisters, bum sores, hallucinations and even a Saharan sandstorm later, the team reached dry land; rowing into English Harbour after 40 days, 17 hours and 40 minutes.

On reflection, Charlie said "it was the relentlessness that made this race so

unique". From day one, they looked to hold an unforgiving shift pattern of 2-hours rowing and just one-hour off the oars. This left little time for rest and recovery and as the days past, their bodies slowly broke down as they fought against the constant salty spray. Moreover, basic admin such as making meals or washing bodies became a near impossible task in the endlessly choppy seas.

The 7th boat out of 38, winners of the trio category and first military crew to finish, TEAM V3NTURE have raised near £200,000 with a £20,000 going toward each Regimental Charity, including the RACF. A huge well done to Charlie, Rob and Rob!

Story from the RHQ RA Home Team

Following many years of campaigning, in November 2022, the British Government announced the creation of a new medal intended to recognise the contribution of military and civilian personnel that took part in the various programmes aimed at developing nuclear weapons to be used by the British Armed Forces. The announcement was made to coincide with the 70th anniversary of the first UK nuclear test. In July 2023, the design of the new medal was released, with a commitment that many eligible veterans would receive their medals by Remembrance Sunday in November 2023.

Ms Karen Taylor who works here at RHQ RA in Officer Recruiting was recently awarded the medal posthumously on behalf of her Father. Chief Technician - Roy Albert Grant who served on Christmas Island in 1957.

The sadness that her father never physically received the medal in his lifetime, does not detract from the pride Karen and her wider family feel in the fact that Roy's service and dedication has now been recognised.

The medal features a crowned effigy of Charles III facing right with the inscription CHARLES III DEI GRATIA REX FID DEF on the obverse, while the reverse shows an atom design surrounded by olive branches, with the words NUCLEAR TEST MEDAL beneath. It was manufactured by Worcestershire Medal Service.

The ribbon has a central white stripe, with symmetrical stripes of yellow, black and red, and sky blue stripes on the outer edge – the blue is intended to represent the sky and the sea in the Pacific, where the UK's nuclear tests took place.


