### Lieutenant General Mike Elviss CB MBE Master Gunner St James's Park

It is a tremendous privilege to write to you for the first time in my capacity as Master Gunner St James's Park, the custodian of our proud heritage and a witness to the evolving character of the Royal Regiment at a time of profound transformation. I commissioned into the Royal Regiment in 1995, served as a junior officer in 29th Commando Regiment Royal Artillery, commanded batteries in 26th Regiment Royal Artillery and 3rd Regiment Royal Horse Artillery, and commanded 1st Regiment Royal Horse Artillery. I have also been fortunate to have Gunners under command as the Brigade Commander of 20th Armoured Brigade and as General Officer Commanding 3rd (United Kingdom) Division. The same is true of my current post, Commander Field Army, and in my former guise as the Regimental Colonel Commandant. I know our Regiment well.

Accordingly, I am well placed to confirm that the Gunners remain at the heart of the Army's operational capability and our way of fighting. 'Find and Strike' sits at the core of our profession. The past year has seen the Regiment navigate a complex landscape: strategic uncertainty abroad, fiscal constraints at home, and the ever-accelerating pace and democratisation of technological change. Yet, in the face of these pressures, our soldiers have demonstrated the resilience and professionalism that have come to define the Gunners. Our operational commitments remain extensive. Gunners continue to be deployed in support of NATO and UK interests around the world. The Regiment continues to provide people, and expertise that are indispensable to joint operations.

That all said, the character of warfare is changing, and so must we. I believe we are on the right track.

The integration of targeting, air defence, long-range precision fires, UAS, and digital fire control is no longer aspirational, it is essential. The introduction of AJAX and the next generation artillery systems of MFP, MLRS (M270 A2), TAIPAN and SKYSABRE, to name but a few, mark a

significant leap forward. These systems will allow us to find, fix and finish targets at greater distances with unprecedented accuracy, but they also require new skills, new thinking, and a new culture of innovation. The Royal Artillery has always been a forward-looking arm, embracing art and science. Today, our challenge is to ensure that every Gunner, from the newest recruit to the most senior commander, is equipped not only with the tools of modern warfare but with the mindset to exploit them fully. And that mindset extends beyond exploiting equipment, it is the mindset that prepares us for fighting wars, the inexorable desire to win.

At the heart of our Regiment remain our people, both serving and retired. In times of change, our common identity bonds us together. The Royal Regiment of Artillery starts as a collection of batteries - but it is also a family, bound by shared history and common purpose. Our battle honour, Ubique – "Everywhere" – is not just a reflection of our global deployments, but of our enduring presence on every battlefield of the British Army. I remain fiercely proud of having earned the right to be called a Gunner. I know you are too. That identity lasts a lifetime; 'Once a Gunner always a Gunner' manifests itself in our vibrant Royal Artillery Association and through the amazing work our charities do to support our serving and veteran

The next decade will test us. Strategic competition is intensifying, and the character of conflict is evolving. We must be ready, not just to fight, but to lead others. We must be in the vanguard of innovation, and the standard-bearers of professionalism. Your service, be that in the past or in the present matters. Let us meet the coming challenges with the courage, and the clarity of thought and action which typifies our fine Regiment. Ubique.

### Resilience in Action: A Regimental Day of Reflection, Inspiration and Strength



Regimental Resilience Day, Newcome Hall, The Royal School of Artillery

### The Vision Behind the Day

### **Understanding Resilience in Real Terms**

Rather than focusing on rigid categories, person concept, touching every part of life, mental agility to emotional regulation and the importance of strong social bonds. WO2 Katie Strickland and Captain These ideas were brought to life through real stories that highlighted the power of connection, honesty, and perseverance.

### **Voices of Experience**

Major Jennifer Stephenson RA shared her journey as a member of the Ice Maidens and the All-Arms Commando Course. She spoke



during Arctic preparations, and the silent support of her teammates. She emphasised self-awareness, the ability to talk to others, and the power of imagery arousal, echoing DCMH's sentiments. Big Phil Campion, former 22 SAS and bestselling author, recounted Operation Barras and reflected on the importance of positive role models, stating 'you cannot be what you cannot see.' He warned that one is only ever two bad decisions away from losing everything, underscoring the need for grounded leadership and resilience. Melvyn Downes, also former 22 SAS, shared his journey from facing racial harassment to becoming one of the first British-born Black men in the SAS. He spoke about the influence of David Stirling and his father Sammy Downes, highlighting values such as the unrelenting we invest in the strength of our regiment. pursuit of excellence, self-discipline, classlessness, humility, and humour, all of which shaped his resilience.

### A Shared Commitment

The day concluded with a formal dinner in the Warrant Officers' and Sergeants' Mess, attended by senior NCOs and officers. This shared experience reinforced regimental unity and mutual respect, strengthening the bonds that underpin operational effectiveness.

### **Looking Ahead**

Regimental Resilience Day was more than a one-off event, it was a catalyst for cultural change. It opened conversations, challenged assumptions, and reminded us that even the strongest among us need support. The overwhelmingly positive response from across the regiment makes one thing clear: this is a tradition worth continuing. By investing in the resilience of our people,

### Junior Leaders Regiment Royal Artillery Oct 1985 intake reunion – 25 Oct 2025


### RA CEREMONY OF REMEMBRANCE


